Types of contracts



- Employment contract
- Cellphone contract
- Lease and Sale agreement eg. buying a house or a car
- Business contract eg. formation of a company
- · Gym contract
- Marriage contract
- Building contract (if you are building a house or making alterations)

Contract information



- · States what is expected of you
- States what you expect of the other person or organisation
- · Protects each other's rights and obligations
- Compels each party to be responsible for what that party promises to undertake
- Allows the parties to take legal action when one party breaches the contract



Make sure you understand everything in the contract.



Tips



- · Never sign anything that you do not understand
- · Never sign anything that you do not agree with
- · Do not promise something that you cannot provide
- · View your contract in writing
- · Always keep a copy of all documents that you sign



Never sign a contract if you are not sure what you are signing.

Breach of Contract



- Each party to a contract has a duty to perform. If one party performs, and the other party does not, the nonperforming party could face legal consequences
- Failure to perform under the contract amounts to a breach of the contract
- The non-breaching party can file a lawsuit against the other party to recover damages. "Expectation damages" usually put the non-breaching party in the position they would have been in had the other party performed



Breach of contract can result in legal action.
